

FROM FATHER'S DESK

Dear faithful and friends of St. Nicholas,

This month we will hear Jesus tell us the parables of the Tax Collector & the Pharisee (Luke 18:10-14) and the Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-32). The Pharisee stands in judgment of his fellow man, the tax collector. And in the parable of the Prodigal Son we see the element of judgment and, again, it is not God's judgment. The older brother rather than welcoming back his lost brother accuses him, judges him. There's a theme here for us to see, flashing brightly, "if we want to find life with God, do not judge one another!"

Let us give thanks to God that He does not judge us. He does not judge us; in the end, we bring judgment on ourselves. The Pharisee brought judgment on himself by judging his brother, by having a cold heart without a shred of tenderness for the tax collector. The older brother in the parable of the Prodigal Son pouts like a child that his father is not being fair by throwing a party for the son who wasted his inheritance. In truth, God is not just with us. He is not fair, certainly not by the standards we have about justice and fairness. The workers who work for one hour or twelve hours all receive the same pay, Jesus tells us. Not fair. And that's what the older son says today, "not fair."

We give thanks to God that He does not deal fairly with us. He does not deal with us vengefully. Rather, He sends His Son to be with us, to suffer for us, to suffer with us, to win us back for Himself through the love that is humility. Jesus comes to call the sick like Zacchaeus, the outcasts like the tax collector and the failures like the younger son.

Jesus tells the parable of the Prodigal Son to the Pharisees who criticized Him for eating with tax collectors and sinners. The Pharisees judged Jesus for the company He kept. The younger son is a figure of all the tax collectors and sinners who come to Jesus to change their lives. Their hearts are ripe, primed for repentance because they have hit rock bottom like the prodigal son. The soil of their heart is broken, ready to receive the Word of God. The older son is the figure of the Pharisees who do not rejoice at the return of sinners but rather pout, accuse and judge. The father is none other than God Himself.

God Himself who never turns away from us, no matter our sins, whom we cannot escape because He is everywhere present, present within us, in the deepest part of our hearts. There He is. We can run from him, like the younger son. Want to do things our way, convinced that we are right, that we know better. But God pines for us. As one wise priest put it, God is crazily in love with us. He is madly in love with us, unconditionally. The father in the gospel is but an image of the great love that God has for us. A love that is revealed in His humility. A humility that would have a father run to meet his wayward child, to embrace us, to welcome us back into his house. God doesn't say to us, "it's about time you came back." He doesn't say, "you've lost your place as my son or daughter because of your sins." No! Never! When we come to Him in sorrow, confessing our sins He wraps us in the cloak of his love, the mantle of forgiveness. He wants us to be with Him, in His house, sharing in His life, enjoying the heavenly banquet.

This image, of the father rushing to meet his sinful son, to clothe him, throw a banquet for him, this is an image we must keep in our minds, in our hearts. Because each of us is that sinful son. Each of us is in need of confessing our sins, of repenting for our sins. Each of us needs the embrace of our heavenly Father. Each of us must know the profound depth, the inexhaustible nature of God's love for us. In the fallenness of the world we see and hear messages that we are loved if we're rich or thin or beautiful. We all are beautiful in God's eyes. And He loves us unconditionally, fully. This is the lesson we need before we enter into Lent next month. That the school of repentance which is Lent is not a time of miserable despondency over our sins but rather a time to acknowledge our sins, to confess them, to come closer to God. And we will discover, as the younger son did, that as he made the first steps to return, it was his father who ran to meet him before he even got to the house. So, too, our heavenly Father runs to meet us, to usher us into His house, to rejoice over us, the sheep who were lost in sin, but are found, who return to the place where we belong, in the house of our Father to Whom with the Son and Holy Spirit is due our love, thanksgiving and adoration.







Archpastoral Message of His Beatitude, Metropolitan Tikhon on the Great Feast of the Nativity

Christ is born! Glorify Him!

To the Honorable Clergy, Venerable Monastics, and Pious Faithful of the Orthodox Church in America,

My Beloved Brethren and Blessed Children in the Lord,

It is my joy and privilege to greet all of you on the radiant feast of the Nativity of our Lord, God and Savior Jesus Christ. In some 700 communities large and small sprinkled across the North American continent, from Canada, to the United States and Mexico, we gather together to celebrate the wonder of God's entry into human history. For many in our society this message is still as foolish as it was in the first century. But we continue to stand with the



saints beside the manger, the Cross and the empty tomb to proclaim God's sacrificial love for us and for His Creation. As we sing on Christmas Day:

I will give thanks to Thee, O Lord, with my whole heart; I will make all Thy wonders known.

In the company of the upright, in the congregation great are the works of the Lord!

They are studied by all who have pleasure in them!

His work is glory and beauty, and His righteousness endures forever.

-Christmas Day, 1st Antiphon (Psalm 111:1-3)

ISTANBUL, TURKEY – At the invitation of His All-Holiness, Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew, and with the blessing of His Beatitude, Metropolitan Tikhon, Archpriest Dr. Alexander Rentel, Assistant Professor of Canon Law and the John and Paraskeva Skvir Lecturer in Practical Theology at Saint Vladimir's Seminary, Yonkers, NY, represented the Orthodox Church in America at the celebration of the Feast of the Apostle Andrew on November 30, 2015. At the conclusion of the Patriarchal Divine Liturgy, at which he concelebrated, Father Alexander conveyed to Patriarch Bartholomew personal greetings on behalf of Metropolitan Tikhon.

Metropolitan Tikhon attends Georgetown University peace gathering

WASHINGTON, DC – His Beatitude, Metropolitan Tikhon, was among representatives of the Christian, Islamic, Jewish and Sikh traditions who gathered at Georgetown University here December 16, 2015 for an "Interfaith Event for Peace, Inclusion and Understanding" in the wake of terrorist attacks in Paris and San Bernardino, CA.



In his opening reflection, Donald Cardinal Wuerl, Roman Catholic Archbishop of Washington, noted that the gathering was about refusing to remain silent and condemning intolerance. Offering closing words was US Vice President Joe Biden, who said that "when we turn our backs on the victims of persecution, we abandon everything we say we're about." Also present was US House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi.

As the only Orthodox Christian leader present, Metropolitan Tikhon delivered the closing prayer, during which he prayed, "Enable us to love others with the sacrificial and self-emptying love that we see in your Servant Jesus Christ, Who comes to us in extreme humility."

Through the Orthodox Christian Fellowship [OCF], Orthodox Christianity has maintained a visible presence on the Georgetown Campus for three decades under the OCF's chaplain, Archpriest Constantine White.

Judge Lanier will have oversight responsibilities for legal matters in the OCA's central administration.

Board continues Parsonage Designation Declaration for retirees


