STICHERA AT VESPERS FOR THE ENCOUNTER OF THE LORD IN THE TEMPLE

Symeon, tell us, Whom you bear in your arms, that you rejoice so greatly in the Temple? To Whom do you shout and cry aloud: “Now I am set free, for I have seen my Savior?” This is He Who was born of a Virgin; this is God the Word, Who came forth from God, Who for our sakes has taken flesh and has saved mankind. Let us worship Him!

Symeon, receive Him Whom Moses once beheld in darkness, granting the Law on Sinai, now that He has become a Babe subject to the Law! This is He Who spoke through the Law. This is He, of Whom the Prophets spoke, Who for our sakes has taken flesh and has saved mankind. Let us worship Him!

Come, let us also go to meet Christ with divine songs! Let us receive Him Whose salvation Symeon saw! This is He Whom David announced; this is He Who spoke in the Prophets, Who, for our sakes, has taken flesh and Who speaks through the Law. Let us worship Him!

Let the gate of heaven be opened today, for the unoriginate Word of the Father has made a beginning in time without forsaking His divinity. As a baby forty days old, of His own will He is brought by the Virgin, His Mother, as an offering in the Temple of the Law. The Elder receives Him in his arms, crying as a servant to his Master: “Set me free for my eyes have seen Your Salvation!” Glory to You, O Lord, for You have come into the world to save mankind.

LITY STICHERA

The Ancient of Days, Who gave Moses the Law on Sinai in former times, today appears as a Child. As Maker of the Law, He fulfills the Law. He is brought into the Temple according to the Law, and given over to the Elder. Symeon the righteous receives Him. Beholding the fulfillment of the divine order now brought to pass, rejoicing aloud, he cries: “My eyes have seen the mystery hidden from the ages made manifest in these latter days, the Light that disperses the foolishness of the faithless Gentiles, and the glory of the newly-chosen Israel! Therefore set free your servant from the bonds of this flesh to the life filled with wonder that knows no age or end, for You grant the world great mercy!”

Today He Who once gave the Law to Moses on Sinai submits Himself to the commandments of the Law, becoming for our sakes like us in His compassion. Now the God of purity as a holy Child has opened a pure womb, and as God He is brought as an offering to Himself, setting us free from the curse of the Law, and granting light to our souls.

FROM FATHER'S DESK

Beloved,

February 2 is forty days since we celebrated the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ. This fortieth day is also a great feast like Christmas. On it we remember how the Ancient of Days, the Son of God, fulfilled the very law he gave to Moses on Mount Sinai. The Son of God told Moses that the first born should be dedicated to him and that on the fortieth day an offering be made in the temple. Those with money would offer a lamb. Mary and Joseph make an offering of a pair of turtledoves because they were poor.

In all of this we see the profound humility of the Son of God. God's Son lowered himself to be born as one of us, as one of his own creation. He willed to be circumcised according to the Law that he himself gave (a feast we celebrate on January 1, eight days after his birth). And he condescends to be brought into the Temple as a forty-day old child. He who is the Ancient of Days, God Himself enters the Temple built by human hands. He comes to fulfill the whole of the Law that we may be perfected by grace. He comes to undergo everything we do, birth, life, death so that our human nature might be filled with his presence in all its moments.

Jesus' coming into the Temple is an encounter with the people of Israel in the persons of Symeon and the prophetess Anna. These two, Symeon and Anna, awaited the fulfillment of the promise that the Messiah would come to Israel. And now they, in their old age, behold what so many generations longed to see but did not see fulfilled: the Messiah, God with us, living among us as one of us.

Symeon blesses Mary and Joseph foretelling that the Messiah would be welcomed by some and rejected by others. And Anna spoke of this child to all who were looking for the salvation from God. Symeon even calls the child "Salvation" when he prays, "Now set free your servant, Master, according to your word in peace, for my eyes have seen your Salvation..." Symeon has seen the Father's Salvation who is the Son of God now made flesh, our Lord Jesus Christ. In Symeon's old age he has now seen what was promised so long ago, a Savior who would deliver us from the sickness of sin, opening to us a true life in him.

Symeon prayed this hymn when he held in his arms the Savior: "Now set free your servant, Master, according to your word in peace, for my eyes have seen your Salvation, whom you have prepared before the face of all peoples – Light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the Glory of your people Israel." Symeon asks for a blessed death as he glorifies the true Light who has entered the world.

The hymn of Symeon is a fixture in our prayer life in the Church. We sing this hymn at every Vespers. We sing this hymn at the churching of every person before Baptism, when the priest presents the person to God in the temple. We pray this hymn as part of our prayers of thanksgiving after receiving our Lord Jesus Christ in Holy Communion. At seminary we sang this hymn after every Divine Liturgy as part of our thanksgiving to God.

When we receive Holy Communion we are receiving the Son of God made man. We are receiving our Lord Jesus Christ, the same Lord whom Symeon held in his arms. And we, like Symeon, can say all is fulfilled, completed and perfected because we have encountered our Salvation, the Son of God. This is a tremendous mystery that we receive what appears to be bread and wine yet by faith we know it to be the Body and Blood of Christ, the food of immortality. How blessed we are to receive Christ! How blessed we are to welcome Him as we become temples of the living God. How blessed are we to know our Lord Jesus Christ who saves us from our sins. In receiving Christ in the Eucharist we have seen the True Light who enlightens us. We receive the Son of God who has marked us with the light of His Face. Let us give thanks to the Lord as we walk in his light, in the way of his commandments in this age so that we might see the light of his unapproachable glory in its fullness in the age to come.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING is Tuesday, February 13 at 6:30.

ANNUAL MEETING The Annual Meeting of Saint Nicholas Church will be held on Sunday, January 28, 2024. Details will be in the March newsletter.

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE The first order of business was to elect the officers of the parish council and a non-office member of the executive committee. President: nominees Sharon Jernigan and Stephanie Price. Sharon Jernigan was elected. Vice president: Paul Brayan was the only nominee and accepted. Treasurer: Susie Ford was the only nominee and accepted. Secretary: Barry Cavett was the only nominee and accepted. Non-officer on executive committee: Dennis Jernigan was the only nominee and accepted. *Financial report:* Tithes and offerings were down \$19,000 for 2023 compared to 2022. The year 2023 ended with a deficit of \$4,500. Passing the stewardship plate has led to an increase in tithes and offerings, especially in loose offering. When using Givelify please consider giving to cover the cost of the Givelify processing fee. The diocesan assessment is no longer a per person fee but is a percentage of income (5%) for each parish in the diocese. *Endowment report:* no report. *Rector's report:* highlights - Dormition Winter Dinner is scheduled for Thursday, January 18 at Saint George Banquet Center with the topic *A Rule of Prayer*. Kathy Gonser is our parish representative and the main meal which our parish is preparing is being overseen by Sharon and Dennis Jernigan, Kathy Gonser, and Father Matthew. "A Christian Ending" seminar with Deacon Mark Barna will be hosted at Saint Mary Magdalene Church May 24-25. Details will be published. Father Matthew thanked parish council members and the parishioners for their support of his assisting Archbishop Alexander after his surgery. *Church school/youth ministry:* the rest of the 2023-2024 school year is all set. End of the school year is Sunday, May 19. *Community outreach:* Stephanie Price prepared a calendar of events for 2024 which will be published in the newsletter, bulletin, online calendar, Facebook page, and website. Add "opt in to text messages" on the visitor sign-in sheet. Stephanie Price is looking into Project Broadcast to send text messages for updates to parishioners. *Fundraising:* Theophany banquet on January 14. Dance on March 9. Meatfare dinner on March 10, Cheesefare dinner on March 17. August 18 is our outdoor Liturgy and picnic which will feature the Skimos Band. Pass along the word! A Facebook page will be created with a link to a sign-up sheet. *Charity:* North End Soup Kitchen service is Thursday, February 1 from 9 am to 12:30 pm. *Buildings and maintenance:* Pavilion needs some work on the cracks and levelling before the August Liturgy, picnic, and dance. Some carpentry work needs to be done. Floor of pavilion needs to be done first. Bench seats need some work. Light fixture was replaced in the south altar area (formerly bathroom). Some of sewer pipes are cracked and leaking into tunnels under church. The wiring from the electrical box into the tunnel has a short in it somewhere under the concrete. New lines have to be run over from the electric box to the tunnel. Someone needs to get into the tunnel at least once a year to check the wiring and add lubricant to stop corrosion - from one end to the other. A scheduled maintenance list is being planned. *Old business:* None. *New business:* Housing allowance for Father Matthew approved - same as 2023. Our choir director, Reader J. Joseph Tome, needs a new computer which he uses the vast majority of the time to prepare music - \$500 to \$600. Parish council will obtain more details before making a decision.

MEMORIAL SATURDAY / SOULS' SATURDAY The first Memorial Saturday of 2024 is March 9 which we will observe with 10 am Divine Liturgy followed by a Trisagion for the fallen asleep. We pray for the dead because it is handed on to us from the Scriptures. As members of the Church, the Body of Christ, we are exhorted to pray for one another ([James 5:16](#)). Whether we live or die, "we belong to the Lord" ([Romans 14:8](#)). For we are "members of His Body, of His flesh and of His bones" ([Ephesians 5:30](#)). The Church is "the heavenly Jerusalem, the city of the living God". As such, she includes "tens of thousands of angels" and "the spirits of righteous people completed (in death)" as well as those of us alive on earth ([Hebrews 12:22-24](#)). Death does not end our membership in the Body of Christ. For neither "death nor life [...] will separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" ([Romans 8:38-39](#)). We remember that God "is not the God of the dead, but of the living - for all are alive to Him" ([Luke 20:38](#)). Therefore, we pray for both the living and for the "dead in Christ" ([1 Thessalonians 4:16](#)).

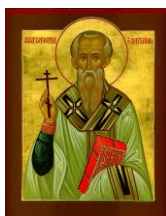

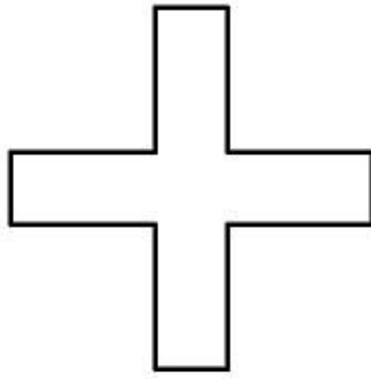
