THE READING FROM THE EPISTLE OF THE APOSTLE PAUL TO THE HEBREWS (11:24-26, 32-12:2)

Brethren: by faith Moses, when he was grown up, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter, choosing rather to share ill-treatment with the people of God than to enjoy the fleeting pleasures of sin. He considered abuse suffered for the Christ greater wealth than the treasures of Egypt, for he looked to the reward. And what more shall I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets -- who through faith conquered kingdoms, enforced justice, received promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched raging fire, escaped the edge of the sword, won strength out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight. Women received their dead by resurrection. Some were tortured, refusing to accept release that they might rise again to a better life. Others suffered mocking and scourging, and even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned, they were sawn in

two, they were killed with the sword; they went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, afflicted, ill-treated -- of whom the world was not worthy -- wandering over deserts and mountains, and in dens and caves of the earth. And all these, though well attested by their faith, did not receive what was promised, since God had foreseen something better for us, that apart from us they should not be made perfect. Therefore, having around us a cloud of witnesses, laying aside all weight and the sin which surrounds us, we also in forbearance run the race set before us, keeping our eyes on Jesus the source and perfecter of the faith, who instead of the joy set before Him forbore the cross, despising shame, and sat at the right side of the throne of God. Think then of the such one who forbore onto himself hostility from the sinners, so that you are not hard pressed weary in your souls!

THE HOLY GOSPEL ACCORDING TO JOHN (1:43-51) At that time Jesus decided to go to Galilee. And he found Philip and said to him, "Follow me." Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the city of Andrew and Peter. As the prophets beheld, / as the Apostles have taught, / as the Church has received, / as the Teachers have declared, / as the world has agreed, / as Grace has shown forth; / as Truth has been revealed, / as falsehood has been dissolved, / as Wisdom has become manifest, / as Christ awarded / - thus we declare, / thus we assert, / thus we preach Christ our true God, / and honor His Saints / in words, / in writings, / in thoughts, / in sacrifices, / in churches, / in Holy Icons; / on the one hand worshipping and reverencing Christ as God and Lord; / and on the other hand honoring the saints as true servants of the same Lord of all and accordingly offering them veneration. / This is the Faith of the Apostles, / this is the Faith of the Fathers, / this is the Faith of the Orthodox, / this is the Faith which has established the universe. / These preachers of true piety, we praise as brothers and as those we long to have as our fathers, to the glory and honor of the true Faith for which they struggled, and we say: To the champions of Orthodoxy, pious Emperors, most-holy Patriarchs, Hierarchs, Teachers, Martyrs, and Confessors:

The Great Prokeimenon - Tone 7 - Psalm 76

Who is so great a God as our God? You are the God Who does wonders!

v: You have made known your Power among the peoples.

v: And I said, "Now have I begun. This is the change of the Right hand of the Most High."

v: I remembered the works of the Lord, for I will remember his wonderful things from the beginning.

The holy Gospel according to Luke 24:12-35 (5th Matins Gospel)

But Peter arose and ran to the tomb; and stooping down, he saw the linen cloths lying by themselves; and he departed, marveling to himself at what had happened. Now behold, two of them were traveling that same day to a village called Emmaus, which was seven miles from Jerusalem. And they talked together of all these things which had happened. So it was, while they conversed and reasoned, that Jesus Himself drew near and went with them. But their eyes were restrained, so that they did not know Him. And He said to them, "What kind of conversation is this that you have with one another as you walk and are sad?" Then the one whose name was Cleopas answered and said to Him, "Are You the only stranger in Jerusalem, and have You not known the things which happened there in these days?" And He said to them, "What things?" So they said to Him, "The things concerning Jesus of Nazareth, who was a Prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how the chief priests and our rulers delivered Him to be condemned to death, and crucified Him. But we were hoping that it was He who was going to redeem Israel. Indeed, besides all this, today is the third day since these things happened. Yes, and certain women of our company, who arrived at the tomb early, astonished us. When they did not find His body, they came saying that they had also seen a vision of angels who said He was alive. And certain of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but Him they did not see. Then He said to them, "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe in all that the prophets have spoken! Ought not the Christ to have suffered these things and to enter into His glory? And beginning at Moses and all the Prophets, He expounded to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning Himself. Then they drew near to the village where they were going, and He indicated that He would have gone farther. But they constrained Him, saying, "Abide with us, for it is toward evening, and the day is far spent." And He went in to stay with them. Now it came to pass, as He sat at the table with them, that He took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened and they knew Him; and He vanished from their sight. And they said to one another, "Did not our heart burn within us while He talked with us on the road, and while He opened the Scriptures to us?" So they rose up that very hour and returned to Jerusalem, and found the eleven and those who were with them gathered together, saying, "The Lord is risen indeed, and has appeared to Simon!" And they told about the things that had happened on the road, and how He was known to them in the breaking of bread.

SUNDAY OF ORTHODOXY For more than one hundred years the Church of Christ was troubled by the persecution of the Iconoclasts of evil belief, beginning in the reign of Leo the Isaurian (717-741) and ending in the reign of Theophilus (829-842). After Theophilus's death, his widow the Empress Theodora (celebrated Feb. 11), together with the Patriarch Methodius (June 14), established Orthodoxy anew. This ever-memorable Queen venerated the icon of the Mother of God in the presence of the Patriarch Methodius and the other confessors and righteous men, and openly cried out these holy words: "If anyone does not offer relative worship to the holy icons, not adoring them as though they were gods, but venerating them out of love as images of the archetype, let him be anathema." Then with common prayer and fasting during the whole first week of the Forty-day Fast, she asked God's forgiveness for her husband. After this, on the first Sunday of the Fast, she and her son, Michael the Emperor, made a procession with all the clergy and people and restored the holy icons, and again adorned the Church of Christ with them. This is the holy deed that all we the Orthodox commemorate today, and we call this radiant and venerable day the Sunday of Orthodoxy, that is, the triumph of true doctrine over heresy. *from goarch.org*



Archbishop Alexander’s pastoral letter for Great Lent 2022

Dearly beloved in the Lord,

Two years ago, as the coronavirus began to spread across the United States, I spoke in my Lenten message about unprecedented times and the need for increased prayer and faithfulness as we entered our journey to Pascha. This year we find ourselves in times, not unprecedented, but for many unexpected nonetheless. Once again, I urge you to redouble your Lenten efforts.

In my previous letter concerning Ukraine, I called upon our parishes and monastic communities to include a special petition in the Litany of Fervent Supplication. I urge our clergy to not neglect this petition in the Divine services. I also encourage our faithful to include the following prayer for peace, based on the Moleben for Peace from the Orthodox Peace Fellowship, in their personal prayer rules:

"Lord Jesus Christ, Prince of Peace, uproot in me hatred, envy and jealousy and all other passions which destroy brotherly love. Kindled in me the fervent love of God and neighbor, that I may not love the world and that which is in the world, but rather have true love for you and for your glory. Grant that I may truly love, not only my friends and family, but following your command my enemies too, and do good to those who hate me. May I examine and humble myself before you and before everyone, never judging my brothers and sisters, but loving them as my very self, by the power, action, and grace of the Most-Holy Spirit. Amen."

Finally, a word of caution to our faithful. History has demonstrated time and again that, when faced with threats in other parts of the world, there is a temptation to take out our anxieties and fear on people from that part of the world who are in our communities. This is wrong. I cannot be any clearer than that. The Russians and people of Russian descent in our parishes and communities had no part in the aggression in Ukraine. They are as anxious and afraid as everyone else and we must stand together, brothers and sisters in faith, calling upon the Lord "with one heart and one mind."

A much-loved saying of St. Seraphim of Sarov is, "Acquire the Spirit of Peace and thousands around you will be saved." Cultivating a peaceful heart is the most significant act any believer can do for the world. May this Lenten season, as uncertain as our-times may be, find inner stillness growing within us through a deeper communion with the One who promises a "peace that passes human understanding." (Philippians 4:7)
