St Ephrem of Nisibis "to the indolent soul" "Soul: do not be downcast, and do not be anxious. Neither count yourself to be in a multitude of sins. Do not draw upon yourself the fire. Say not, "The Lord has cast me away from his face," for saying this will not reconcile you to God. He cries to you, saying, *My people what have I done to you? How have I grieved you? Or how have I troubled you?* (Micah 6:3). When someone falls, does he not get up? And when someone is turned around, does he not turn back?

Soul: do you not hear of the goodness of the Lord? Have you not been redeemed, as one condemned at the hands of a ruler or a general? Do not be anxious that you have wasted your riches. Do not be ashamed to turn back. Rather, say, *I will arise and return to my Father* (Luke 11:18).

Arise and go! He will receive you. He will not upbraid you. Rather, he will even rejoice at your return. He will take you in. Only, do not be ashamed, like Adam. Do not hide from the face of God.

For your sake was Christ crucified. Will he then reject you? Of course not! For he knows what troubles us, and he alone is our helper. Christ knows that man is miserable. Let us not disregard this, as if we wanted to burn. For Christ has no need to cast anyone into the fire. He gains nothing by sending us to be punished.

Do you wish to learn what the punishment entails? For when the sinner has been driven from the face of God, the very foundations of the earth cannot endure the cry of his groaning. For it is written, *That day shall be a day of darkness and gloom, a day of cloud and fog, a day of trumpet and shouting* (Zephaniah 1:15-16). For if a condemned man is exiled by a ruler for two, five, or ten years, what sort of anguish, shame, and groaning do you imagine that man would have? And yet this man is comforted by the fact that his time will come to an end. We wish, therefore, to learn the time of sinners. How long will their exile last? Twenty years? Fifty? One-hundred? Five-hundred? How can we count the time, when the days and years never reach a number? Woe! Woe! The time is unknown. For the wrath that threatens sinners has also yet to be seen.

Do you hear the distress of sinners? Do not disgrace yourself with this necessity. For you need not fall under this threat. Do you have a multitude of sins? Do not hold back from crying to the Lord. Go! Do not be ashamed. The path is near. Arise and shake off the excrement of this world. Imitate the prodigal son. For, when he lost everything, he was not embarrassed to go to his father. The father, for his part, was more concerned about his son's captivity than the original riches that he lost. Thus, he approached without embarrassment, and he entered the house as nobility. He arrived naked, and he was received with robes. He presented himself as a hired servant, and he was restored to his position as master.

This story is directed at us! Do you see how much was solved by the son's lack of embarrassment? Do you understand the father's goodness? You, too, Soul: do not hesitate. Knock! Do you need something? Wait at the door and you will receive everything that you require, as the divine Scripture says: *On account of his shamelessness, he will rise and give him whatsoever he requires* (Luke 11:8). He will not reject you. He will not upbraid you, man, for the original riches that have been lost. For he has no lack of money. He gives to all *eagerly*, as the Apostles says. *Ask of God, who gives to all simply and without reproach* (James 1:5).

Are you at rest in the harbor? Ignore the waves, lest you be snatched, all of a sudden, into the depths of the sea by an oncoming storm. Then you will begin to say, with groaning, *I am come into the depths of the sea and the squall has plunged me down. I am weary with shouting and my throat is grown hoarse* (Ps 68:3-4). For the abyss of the sea is truly Hades, according to the Lord, who said that there is a great chasm between the righteous and sinners (Luke 16:26).

Therefore, do not condemn yourself to that chasm. Imitate the prodigal son. Leave the city that is in famine. Abandon the misery of the swine. Rest from eating their pods, and do not take them up again.

Come, then, and be comforted. Eat continually of the Manna, the sustenance of angels. Come, that you may behold the Glory of God and your face may be enlightened. Come, dwell in the Paradise of delight. Abandon your brief years and take hold of eternity. Let not the span of this present life disturb you. It is swift and short. From Adam until now the time has passed as a shadow. Prepare yourself for the journey. Do not overburden yourself. Winter approaches. Take up your covering, which we, too, by the grace of Christ, are seeking. Amen." *Ad animam neglegentem* (CPG 4059), ed. K.G. Phrantzoles, *Ociov Έφραiμ τοῦ Σύρου ἔργα* 5. FROM FATHER'S DESK

Beloved,

To make room for Christ in us, we follow Him, we deny ourselves, crucify our ego and selfishness so that He may increase in us. This we do not because we are forced to do so but because we express our love for God through this. We make our love of God visible through the self-denial of fasting. Christ Jesus Himself fasted from all food and drink for forty days in the desert where he was tempted by the devil.

There are two types of fasting we keep: the ascetical fast we observe during the seasons of the Great Fast, the Apostles' Fast, Dormition Fast, and Christmas Fast (no meat, dairy products, eggs, etc.). We also keep such a fast on most of the Wednesdays and Fridays throughout the year. Wednesdays because it is the day Judas went to the chief priests to betray Jesus. Fridays because it is the day our Lord died upon the cross for us. There are certain fast-free days and time in the year such as the time from Christmas until the eve of Theophany, the week following the Sunday of the Publican and the Pharisee, Bright Week and Pentecost Week.

Fr. Andrew Jarmus says this on fasting, "How strict should we be in our fasting? My rule of thumb is that our fast should be a challenge, but not overwhelming. Fasting is kind of like driving on a snowy, slippery road. The best results come from taking it easy and maintaining steady momentum, rather than giving it full gas and losing traction (and perhaps crashing)." That is an excellent rule of thumb. The ascetic fast is to curb our physical appetite and quiet our unruly desires so that we focus on the spiritual hunger in us and discover Christ alive in us. If there's a medical necessity for eating certain foods that may not be suitable for a strict fast then you can take on an additional effort whether other prayers or a special almsgiving over and above your lenten observance. As always, if you have any questions about your particular circumstances, please see me and we can talk about it.

Then there's the Eucharistic fast, the total fast (no food, no drink) before we come to receive our Lord Jesus in Holy Communion. For morning Divine Liturgies we fast from midnight from everything — food and drink — for receiving Holy Communion. For evening Liturgies (Vespers with Divine Liturgy or the Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts), we fast from after lunch to receive Communion. Fasting does not make us worthy to receive Christ Jesus in Holy Communion. Fasting is our preparation, to make us ready, to make us hungry for the spiritual and physical nourishment that comes from communion with our Lord Jesus Christ. That said, what about those who have to take medications or who because of illness must have something to eat? As an example, those who are diabetics must follow a schedule for eating in order to keep their blood sugar at safe levels. Others may have to take medicine for blood pressure or their heart. In these and other similar cases we may take food or drink with our medicine as prescribed and still approach to receive our Lord Jesus Christ in Communion. We are not taking these with the intent of breaking the fast or out of disregard for our Lord Jesus but because we want to be good stewards of our health as we approach Him who is the Physician of our souls and bodies. Again, if you have any questions about your particular circumstances, please see me and we can talk some more.

In all things we are to be mindful that fasting is not an end in itself. It is a way we show our love for God. The ascetic fast also works to tame our passions, open us up to experience Christ, finding out that in our seeking Him we discover that He finds us first. The Eucharistic fast is a concrete way of living the truth that we do not live on bread alone but every word that comes from the mouth of God. It is the Word of God Himself, our Lord Jesus Christ, Whom we receive into our souls and bodies through Holy Communion. With love in our hearts and non-judgement of others our fast will be spiritually healthy.

The Pharisee in the parable of the Publican and the Pharisee prayed to God saying, "I fast twice a week, I give tithes of all that I get." (Luke 18:12) But our Lord Jesus warned the Pharisees, "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for you tithe mint and dill and cumin, and have neglected the weightier matters of the law, justice and mercy and faith; these you ought to have done, without neglecting the others." (Matthew 23:23) We can keep the fast and have a hardened heart towards one another. If we fail to be loving then our fasting is fruitless. We are to show mercy <u>and</u> fast. It is not one or the other but both together that will lead us along the path of communion with God. As Saint Paul poetically states in writing to the Christians at Corinth, "If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. If I give away all I have, and if I deliver my body to be burned, but have not love, I gain nothing. So faith, hope, love abide, these three; but the greatest of these is love." The motion was made by Stephanie Price and seconded by Connie Maxim to nominate Eileen Branoff as interim secretary of parish council, approved. Reading the Scriptures of the day during the Great Fast and the hymns from the Triodion leads us along the journey to Pascha.

RESOURCES FOR THE GREAT FAST

Beloved in the Lord,

As we approach the Great forty days' Fast (Great Lent) I want to help prepare and encourage you with these various resources for your Lenten journey.

The season of the Great Fast is the time of preparation for the feast of the Resurrection of Christ. It is the living symbol of a human's entire life which is to be fulfilled in your own resurrection from the dead with Christ. It is a time of renewed devotion: of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. It is a time of repentance, a real renewal of our minds, hearts and deeds in conformity with Christ and his teachings. It is the time, most of all, of our return to the great commandments of loving God and our neighbors.

In the Orthodox Church, Great Lent is not a season of morbidity and gloominess. On the contrary, it is a time of joyfulness and purification. We are called to "anoint our faces" and to "cleanse our bodies as we cleanse our souls." The very first hymns of the very first service of Great Lent set the proper tone of the season: "Let us begin the lenten time with delight . . . let us fast from passions as we fast from food, taking pleasure in the good words of the Spirit, that we may be granted to see the holy passion of Christ our God and his holy Pascha, spiritually rejoicing."

"Your grace has arisen upon us, O Lord, the illumination of our souls has shown forth; behold, now is the acceptable time; behold, now is the time of repentance" (Vespers Hymns).

It is our repentance that God desires, not our remorse. We sorrow for our sins, but we do so in the joy of God's mercy. We mortify our flesh, but we do so in the joy of our resurrection into life everlasting. We make ready for the resurrection during Great Lent, both Christ's Resurrection and our own. (<u>source</u>)

Attending Services during Lent

This is the season of a marked increase in divine services. Please simplify, plan ahead, and prepare yourself for attending as many of the services of the Church as possible. I especially encourage a serious effort for laying that groundwork in the first week of Lent. There is a service to attend every day. Take turns with your spouse in attending services. Turn off Netflix, silence your phone notifications, give of your time and treasures, eat less, and pray more. You will discover that Christ is closer to you than you are to yourself...

<u>Praying during Lent</u>

Seek God in prayer. Read the Psalms. Do your morning and evening prayers. Consult the priest and get a prayer rule. Read these <u>homilies</u> by St. Theophan on prayer. Memorize the prayer of St. Ephraim appointed to be read during the weekdays of Lent. Pray and do prostrations. Use your prayer rope! Seek God in prayer.

Fasting during Lent

"Let us fast with a fast pleasing to the Lord. This is the true fast: the casting off of evil, the bridling of the tongue, the cutting off of anger, the cessation of lusts, evil talking, lies and cursing. The stopping of these is the fast true and acceptable." (Monday Vespers of the First Week).

Fast according to the tradition of the Church. Unless you cannot do so, seek advice as to how to enter into the fast. Refrain from unnecessary and excessive food and drink. The Fathers are clear that our war against the passions starts with fasting. Here is a refresher essay from Metropolitan Kallistos Ware and Mother Mary on the <u>True Nature of Fasting</u>. Here is also a wonderful reflection from Fr. Sergei Sveshnikov <u>Fasting</u> for Non-Monastics. Read more about fasting <u>here</u>.

Almsgiving during Lent

Almsgiving is another invaluable pillar of Lent and of our lives in Christ. Read this <u>reflection</u> on almsgiving. One of the assumptions of the Fast is that the money we save through fasting is owed to the poor. Find a way to give, give in secret, give generously, and give from your heart.

Confessions during Lent

We are given 40 days of the Lenten Season before we enter Holy Week. Please make your confession during these 40 days. I am available for confession by appointment as well as after Vespers on Saturdays. I will not be hearing confessions after the evening service on Holy Wednesday, unless there is a particular need (distance, illness, etc.). If you have any questions please let me know!
