from Wounded by Love

We shouldn't be enraged by people who blaspheme or who speak and act against God and the Church. Such rage is harmful. We may hate the words and the malice behind them, but we must not hate the person who spoke them nor become enraged against him. Rather we should pray for him. A Christian has love and graciousness and should behave accordingly. Just as a hermit, who is seen by no one, benefits the world because the mystical waves of his prayers influence people and transmit the Holy Spirit into the world, so you, too, should scatter your love, without expecting anything in return – with love, patience and a smile...

“Christ gives everything. We must all be humble: in thought, in word and in behaviour. We will never go before God and say, ‘I have virtues.’ God does not want our virtues. Always appear before God as a sinner, not with despair, but ‘trusting in the mercy of His compassion’.”

Think good things about other people. With your prayer, through Christ, you can have a beneficial effect on others. Don't think ill of other people, because then you're a bad influence on them.

People who are humble are cognizant of their inner state and however bad it is, don't lose their personality. They know they're sinners and they mourn over it, but they don't despair, they don't exhaust themselves. Those who have holy humility don't talk at all, in other words they don't react. They allow others to rebuke them, to reproach them without getting angry and finding excuses.

Being indifferent towards the enemy is a great art: the art of arts. And it comes about only by divine Grace. Opposing evil by the Grace of God is achieved bloodlessly and painlessly, without pushing and shoving.

What is stewardship?

We offer ourselves and all creation to God at every Divine Liturgy with the words, "Offering to you your own of your own, on behalf of all and for all." We acknowledge that everything we offer to God is a gift from him. We take what God has given to us and we return it to him as an act of our thanksgiving and praise. As stewards of God's gifts, we return to him a portion of our time, talents and treasures for Christ's work on earth through his Church. The Stewardship Program is an opportunity to respond to Christ's love. Stewardship places the responsibility to support the Church exactly where it belongs, on us.

What do the Scriptures say?

King David said, "all things come from You, and of Your own we have given You." (Chronicles 29:14)

A Steward, according to the Scriptures, is one who manages and uses the gifts entrusted to him or her by God for his or her personal welfare and for the perpetuation of the Lord's work.

Our money and possessions are not ours, but on loan. When we give to the Church, we return to God, the owner, his rightful portion. The more we are given, the more is expected of us.

Why is money needed?

Money is a necessary tool for ministry. To fulfill the Church's mission, we are called upon to commit ourselves to bear our fair share in the financial support of our Church's expenses on a parish and diocesan level.

What guide can I use to determine my giving?

Proportionate giving involves two things. Firstly, that our level of giving rises out of our level of income. Secondly, that giving out of thanks will involve sharing a portion of that income for God's work.

We should ask ourselves "what is a worthy level to determine my Stewardship?" The Scriptures give much guidance by teaching us that direct giving to God and his work should be proportionate to our income, wealth and possessions. Each person is to give according to his or her own ability.

In the Scriptures we read that the standard is the tithe or 10% of one's income. This provides us with the principle that giving should be a proportion of our income. Each Steward should determine what percentage of his or her income will be committed to Christ and the Church.

We should consider what we spend on holidays, pets, dining out, sports events, vacations and so on. How do these compare with our giving for God's work? We should ask ourselves if our Stewardship Commitment is serious and responsible before God. Is our gift a genuine response to the Lord: "Offering to you your own of your own, on behalf of all and for all"?

Am I bound to my stewardship commitment?

Your Stewardship Commitment is kept in confidence. Jesus taught us that giving should be done quietly, generously and out of sight of others. If you wish to revise your commitment during the year for any reason, you may send a note to the Church Office indicating your intention.

How shall I pay my stewardship commitment?

You may pay your commitment in the way that suits you best. Regular weekly or monthly contributions are suggested. An online option is available at our [website](#).

Who will my pledge card include?

The pledge card includes husband and wife for married couples and single adults as Stewards. Family members over 18 years of age, who are employed, should make their own Stewardship Commitment.

How will my pledge card be collected?

The pledge cards can be submitted on any Sunday or can be mailed to or dropped off at the Church Office.

How can a new steward join our church?

Orthodox Christians, who wish to be served by our parish, may become Stewards of Saint Nicholas Orthodox Church by making a filling out a pledge card for their Stewardship Commitment for the current year.

PRAYERS FOR THOSE FALLEN ASLEEP IN THE LORD *The Passion of Perpetua and Felicity* is one of the oldest Christian documents of martyrdom written by St. Perpetua herself in 203 A.D. From St. Perpetua we know that our prayers have an effect on those who have fallen asleep. How, we do not know. We only know that our prayers for the fallen asleep are beneficial for them. Below is a short introduction from The Acts of Perpetua and Felicity and then the text which St. Perpetua wrote concerning her brother Dinocrates who had died.

St. Vibia Perpetua, was martyred in the arena in Carthage on 7 March 203. The account of her martyrdom - technically a Passion has special interest as much of it was written [section 3-10], in Latin by Perpetua herself before her death. This makes it one of the earliest pieces of writing by a Christian woman.

St. Perpetua writes: 7. A few days after, while we were all praying, suddenly in the midst of the prayer I uttered a word and named Dinocrates; and I was amazed because he had never come into my mind save then; and I sorrowed, remembering his fate. And straightway I knew that I was worthy, and that I ought to ask for him. And I began to pray for him long, and to groan unto the Lord. Immediately the same night, this was shown me. I beheld Dinocrates coming forth from a dark place, where were many others also; being both hot and thirsty, his clothing foul, his color pale; and the wound on his face which he had when he died. This Dinocrates had been my brother in the flesh, seven years old, who being diseased with ulcers of the

face had come to a horrible death, so that his death was abominated of all men. For him therefore I had made my prayer; and between him and me was a great gulf, so that either might not go to the other. There was moreover, in the same place where Dinocrates was, a font full of water, having its edge higher than was the boy's stature; and Dinocrates stretched up as though to drink. I was sorry that the font had water in it, and yet for the height of the edge he might not drink. And I awoke, and I knew that my brother was in travail. Yet I was confident I should ease his travail; and I prayed for him every day till we passed over into the camp prison. (For it was in the camp games that we were to fight; and the time was the feast of the Emperor Geta's birthday.) And I prayed for him day and night with groans and tears, that he might be given me.

8. On the day when we abode in the stocks, this was shown me. I saw that place which I had before seen, and Dinocrates clean of body, finely clothed, in comfort; and the font I had seen before, the edge of it being drawn to the boy's navel; and he drew water thence which flowed without ceasing. And on the edge was a golden cup full of water; and Dinocrates came up and began to drink therefrom; which cup failed not. And being satisfied he departed away from the water and began to play as children will, joyfully. And I awoke. Then I understood that he was translated from his pains.

10 YEARS LATER - 2014 PARISH HEALTH WORKSHOP

In November 2014 Mr. Joseph Kormos presented three areas of focus for our parish as we were preparing for our 100th anniversary: 1- Worship, 2- Charity, 3- Financial Generosity. Last month, ten years on since that workshop, we looked at Charity. This month let's look at 3- Financial Generosity.

Stewardship is how we care for what God has given us: the gospel, our life, our health, our possessions, to name a few. Part of our stewardship is our setting aside as an offering to God a portion of our money which we donate through the church. A tithe is 10% of our income. We are to give proportionally, a percentage of our income, as Scripture tells us. Financial generosity is something our Lord asks of us, giving cheerfully from our first-fruits.

- **The median donation is the amount right in the middle for our yearly donations.**

In 2014 our parish's median donation per year was \$800.

Our goal for 2016 was to reach a median donation of \$1500 per year.

In 2024 the median pledge was \$780 per year.


- **In 2014 there were 8 families donating above \$2500 per year.**

Our goal for 2016 was to reach 16 families above \$2500 per year.

In 2024 17 families above \$2500 per year.

Through our commitment to grow in our spiritual life through worship and prayer as well as our commitment to give thanks to God for His gifts to us by our financial generosity may God sustain us.

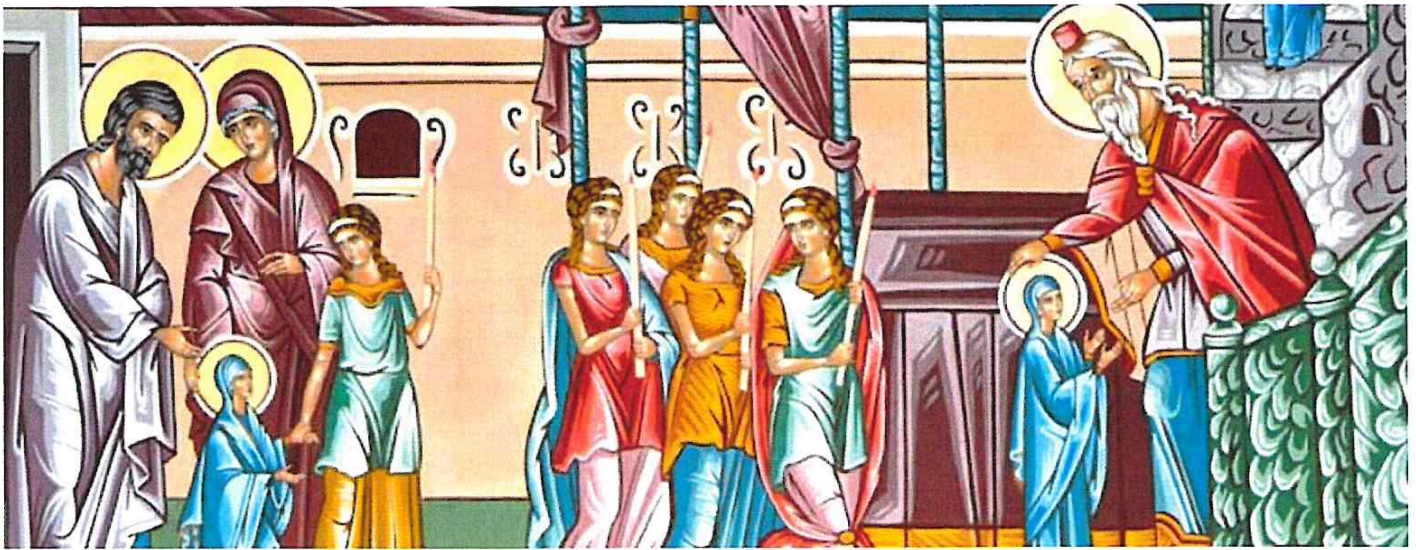
