WISDOM FROM THE SAINTS – ST. ISAAC OF SYRIA

For it would be most odious and utterly blasphemous to think that hate or resentment exists with God, even against a demonic beings; or to imagine any other weakness, or passibility, or whatever else might be involved in the course of retribution of good or bad as applying, in a retributive way, to that glorious divine Nature. Rather, He acts towards us in ways He knows will be advantageous to us, whether by way of things that cause suffering, or by way of things that cause relief, whether they cause joy or grief, whether they are insignificant or glorious: all are directed towards the single eternal good, whether each receives judgement or something of glory from Him not by way of retribution, far from it! but with a view to the advantage that is going to come from all these things. This is how everything works with Him, even though things may seem otherwise to us: with Him it is not a matter of retribution, but He is always looking beyond to the advantage that will come from His dealings with humanity. . . . I am of the opinion that He is going to manifest some wonderful outcome, a matter of immense and ineffable compassion on the part of the glorious Creator, with respect to the ordering of this difficult matter of Gehenna’s torment: out of it the wealth of His love and power and wisdom will become known all the more and so will the insistent might of the waves of His goodness. It is not the way of the compassionate Maker to create rational beings in order to deliver them over mercilessly to unending affliction in punishment for things of which He knew even before they were fashioned, being aware how they would turn out when He created them and whom nonetheless He created. All the more since the fore-planning of evil and the taking of vengeance are characteristics of the passions of created beings, and do not belong to the Creator. . . This is what the Scriptures bring to our attention and remind us of, as has frequently been shown by us in sound expositions above, namely, that God is not one who requites evil, but He sets aright evil: the former is the characteristic of evil people, while the latter is characteristic of a father. Scripture shows Him as if He is bringing good and evil by way of requital, whereas His purpose is not in fact this, but to instill in us love and awe, so that by the latter we might make our conduct chaste, while, by means of love, we might grow in excellency of understanding. If this were not the case, what resemblance does Christ’s coming have with the deeds of the generations which were prior to it? Does this immense compassion seem to you to be a retribution for those evil deeds? Tell me, if God is someone who requites evil, and He does what He does by means of requital, what commensurate requital do you see here, O man? Show me! If we think otherwise than this, then according to the resulting childish view the Creator will prove to be weak I speak as a human being for after what He had established had become corrupted against His will, He devised some other plan, preparing ills in return for its corruption. Such are the feeble ways of understanding the Creator!

FROM FATHER'S DESK

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

To make room for Christ in us, we follow Him, we deny ourselves, crucify our ego and selfishness so that He may increase in us. This we do not because we are forced to do so but because we express our love for God through this. We make our love of God visible through the self-denial of fasting. Christ Jesus Himself fasted from all food and drink for forty days in the desert where he was tempted by the devil.

There are two types of fasting we keep: the ascetical fast we observe during the lenten seasons of Great Lent, the Apostles' Fast, Dormition Fast, and Christmas Fast (no meat, dairy products, eggs, etc.). We also keep such a fast on most of the Wednesdays and Fridays throughout the year. Wednesdays because it is the day Judas went to the chief priests to betray Jesus. Fridays because it is the day our Lord died upon the cross for us. There are certain fast-free days and time in the year such as the time from Christmas until the eve of Theophany, the week following the Sunday of the Publican and the Pharisee, Bright Week and Pentecost Week.

Fr. Andrew Jarmus says this on fasting, "How strict should we be in our fasting? My rule of thumb is that our fast should be a challenge, but not overwhelming. Fasting is kind of like driving on a snowy, slippery road. The best results come from taking it easy and maintaining steady momentum, rather than giving it full gas and losing traction (and perhaps crashing)." That is an excellent rule of thumb. The ascetic fast is to curb our physical appetite and quiet our unruly desires so that we focus on the spiritual hunger in us and discover Christ alive in us. If there's a medical necessity for eating certain foods that may not be suitable for a strict fast then you can take on an additional effort whether other prayers or a special almsgiving over and above your lenten observance. As always, if you have any questions about your particular circumstances, please see me and we can talk about it.

Then there's the Eucharistic fast, the total fast (no food, no drink) before we come to receive our Lord Jesus in Holy Communion. For morning Divine Liturgies we fast from midnight from everything, food and drink, for receiving Holy Communion. For evening Liturgies (Vespers with Divine Liturgy or the Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts), we fast from after lunch to receive Communion. Fasting does not make us worthy to receive Christ Jesus in Holy Communion. Fasting is our preparation, to make us ready, to make us hungry for the spiritual and physical nourishment that comes from communion with our Lord Jesus Christ. That said, what about those who have to take medications or who because of illness must have something to eat? As an example, those who are diabetics must follow a schedule for eating in order to keep their blood sugar at safe levels. Others may have to take medicine for blood pressure or their heart. In these and other similar cases we may take food or drink with our medicine as prescribed and still approach to receive our Lord Jesus Christ in Communion. We are not taking these with the intent of breaking the fast or out of disregard for our Lord Jesus but because we want to be good stewards of our health as we approach Him who is the Physician of our souls and bodies. Again, if you have any questions about your particular circumstances, please see me and we can talk some more.

In all things we are to be mindful that fasting is not an end in itself. It is a way we show our love for God. The ascetic fast also works to tame our passions, open us up to experience Christ, finding out that in our seeking Him we discover that He finds us first. The Eucharistic fast is a concrete way of living the truth that we do not live on bread alone but every word that comes from the mouth of God. It is the Word of God Himself, our Lord Jesus Christ, Whom we receive into our souls and bodies through Holy Communion. With love in our hearts and non-judgement of others our fast will be spiritually healthy.

The Pharisee in the parable of the Publican and the Pharisee prayed to God saying, "I fast twice a week, I give tithes of all that I get." (Luke 18:12) But our Lord Jesus warned the Pharisees, "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for you tithe mint and dill and cumin, and have neglected the weightier matters of the law, justice and mercy and faith; these you ought to have done, without neglecting the others." (Matthew 23:23) We can keep the fast and have a hardened heart towards one another. If we fail to be loving then our fasting is fruitless. We are to show mercy and fast. It is not one or the other but both together that will lead us along the path of communion with God. As Saint Paul poetically states in writing to the Christians at Corinth, "If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. If I give away all I have, and if I deliver my body to be burned, but have not love, I gain nothing. So faith, hope, love abide, these three; but the greatest of these is love." (1 Corinthians 13:1-3, 13).

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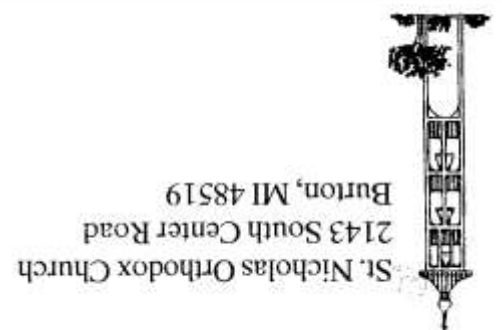


